In recognition of her generosity, the new area will be named, in perpetuity, The Philip M. Stein Entrance and Garden. Her gift not only creates a lasting tribute to her late son Philip, but also makes a direct impact on the patients at the Stern Family Center for Extended Care and Rehabilitation, where expert care allows the majority of residents to return home to continue their recovery. *

NORTH SHORE-LIJ MOURNS PASSING OF **HERMAN MERINOFF**

The North Shore-Long Island Jewish Health System recently lost a dear friend and one of its leading supporters with the death



of Herman Merinoff, who died on June 28, 2006, at the age of 77.

A philanthropist, businessman and lawyer, Mr. Merinoff was involved with North Shore-LIJ for decades, first as a trustee of North Shore University Hospital and more recently as chairman of the board of The Feinstein Institute for Medical Research. During the time leading up to his election as chair, he had participated as an active board member since the founding of The Feinstein Institute in the late 1990's.

In 2004, Mr. Merinoff and his wife Susan provided a generous gift to endow The Susan & Herman Merinoff Center for Patient-Oriented Research, which is an important resource in the discovery and diagnosis of human disease and the development of new treatments. Throughout his life, Mr. Merinoff also devoted much time and energy to countless other philanthropic endeavors. His dedication was recognized with numerous awards from organizations such as the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse, American Cancer Society, Fund for Higher Education and Anti-Defamation League.

Herman Merinoff will be deeply missed and will long be remembered for not only his kind ways but also for the great contributions he made to The Feinstein Institute, the health system and to the entire community.
